Two new initiatives were announced at the annual meeting in addition to the core operations.

#### Re-imagining the FCI

The FCI will be conducting moderated focus groups of our shareholders, customers, and related parties during the current fiscal year. After 13 years the FCI wants to explore what has changed in the needs and desires of its members. The goal is to re-evaluate the desired services, vendors, and other offerings that would be beneficial to our stakeholders.

#### **Inspection Coordination Program**

The FCI will offer to coordinate and provide onsite access for various required inspections. If enough organizations participate the FCI will stream line inspections into a geographically grouped model that will be time and cost effective for all involved. The cost will be \$125 for each Ansul Inspection, Hood Cleaning, Fire Alarm Inspection, Fire Drill, Fire Extinguisher Inspection. The Annual Sprinkler Inspection will cost \$250 due to the length of the visit and multiple vendors involved. This program will be offered starting in January 2017.

The FCI looks forward to its 14 year of operation.

#### The Independent Residence Development Fund

Report to the AILG Plenary – November 9, 2016

#### Contributions

The chart at the right shows a slight drop off in IRDF contributions this past year. This is due primarily to conclusion of major fund drives at three FSILGs, and – once this accounted for – the underlying trend line is very good, with several hundred alums contributing increasing amounts every year. Please thank your alumni for these contributions as well as their generous support of individual direct contributions to your house.

Individual reports of IRDF contributions and benefits for each FSILG are being sent early this November. Specific contribution information is available to houses on request. #### Major Projects Win Awards

In the past few years, three IRDF-financed projects have received major awards for their thoughtful renovations. First was Phi Beta Epsilon's total rehab of their magnificent townhouse at 400 Memorial Drive, Cambridge. Then in 2015 Sigma Chi's work, a splendid renovation and addition of a new top floor at 532 Beacon

Street, was voted the overall "Fan Favorite" of all 10 of Boston Preservation Alliance's best projects. And this year, the New England Chapter of the Victorian Society in America bestowed one of its very selective preservation awards to Chi Phi, for the fraternity's

completion of its restoration of the historic John F. Andrew Back Bay Mansion. This architectural masterpiece at the corner of Hereford and Commonwealth Avenue in Boston has been Chi Phi's home since 1950. We should all be proud of this accomplishments by our FSIG community members.

#### **Community-Wide Grants**

Last year marked the completion of the multi-year program to upgrade connectivity and include all FSILGs in the MIT campus wireless network. Every FSILG now has capability which typically exceeds the MIT dormitories, thanks to the IRDF and the AILG IT Committee's collaboration with MIT's IS&T department. This coming year, the IRDF is financing the replacement of the Ethernet switches for the wired networks within all the houses. Also, the IRDF continues to fund a portion of the costs of the AILG Safety, Licensing and Inspection Program, as well as the

support of the FSILG Cooperative, Inc. in preparing all IRDF applications.

#### Project Grants & Loans

Up to \$200,000 has been allocated again for smaller Project Grants in calendar year 2017, and 11 FSILGs have

already applied. For calendar 2016, seven grants for a variety projects, everything from handicap access ramps, heating system upgrades, to safety upgrades for sprinkler systems and fire escapes. Major programs over \$200,000 will continue to be individually evaluated. Project loans are available at market rates for 30 year terms or less.

#### **Annual Educational Operating Grants**

Over 30 Educational Operating Grants were awarded this past year. A new category for security equipment has been added, alongside with the traditional Safety and Educational items. - The reason why this data cannot be obtained through any other means:

The BDFs are currently the most complete and assembled sources of this information. Specifically:

- The FSILG Office OMM form can be the source for membership, occupancy, and retention data going forward, but the process is relatively new and there was no formal manner of collecting this data beforehand. As such, FSILG Office records are incomplete.
- Recruitment numbers are occasionally posted by The Tech, but they tend to be inconsistent and/or incomplete.
- There are no formal records on spring recruitment participation.
- o There are no formal records of chapter targets vs. what they achieved.

#### • How this data will be used to better the community as a whole:

To reiterate, the goal of the Recruitment Research Committee is to perform an in-depth analysis of MIT fraternity and ILG recruitment practices (Rush), as outlined by AILG Strategic Plan Theme 4. It is also a response to the annual criticisms aimed at fraternity recruitment. By collecting this data, we can dispel myths and present recommendations to the relevant councils and organizations so they can improve their processes. We feel that if we are *not* proactive then we run the risk of having decisions made for us that may be harmful.

Specifically, the data contained in BDFs will primarily contribute to the items mentioned under "Aim 1" in the status slides, e.g. occupancy/move-in trends, post-recruitment retention, and new members from spring recruitment.

## • The number of organizations required to participate to make data analysis meaningful:

The RRC is primarily looking at fraternities and ILGs, as Panhel is performing its own separate recruitment study. As such:

- Given the number of ILGs, all will be needed to make meaningful conclusions about that subset of the community.
- 20 fraternities, based on the number that participated in rush chair feedback sessions in the winter of 2016.

#### When the Plenary can expect to see a first draft of the analysis:

Assuming timely anonymizing and aggregation of the requested data, charts will be presented at the first Plenary of 2017.
