Course description: intensive seminar on the foundations of analytic philosophy for first-year

graduate students.

should be accompanied by a handout (1-2 pages). At least one presentation should be in Power-

point. Two papers are required: one 8 page paper, due October 17<sup>th</sup>; one 12 page paper, due at

the end of term (10<sup>th</sup> December).
