Full recognition

If you want to start a new student group which will be independently run from other campus groups; most importantly, the group must be unique and have a purpose that cannot be fulfilled by other existing student groups. Full ASA recognition is the hardest to obtain, but also gives full access to Student Activities resources. Note that if the ASA Executive Board feels you may fit another activity type better, we will make that recommendation.

Sponsored group

The ASA considers a sponsor **any** department, program, or office of MIT which forms part of the MIT structure and is not run by students. A sponsored group is one which is directly linked with a department, program, or office, and therefore expects to obtain most of its resources from there. ASA recognition allows the group to be run independently of the sponsor, with the ability to reserve space, have a recognized government, request funds, and use the MIT name.

Club Sport

Any group that is related to an athletic activity must first go to the Athletics Department to request to become a Club Sport. If your group needs the support of the Athletics Department in any way - rooms, competitive funds, instructor support - then you must go them first. They will process the request and either grant recognition as a Club Sport, recommend ASA Recognition, or ask the group to wait until resources are available.

FSILGs

In order to help the FSILG groups on campus, the ASA has two forms of recognition for these groups:

Non-residential recognition, for FSILGs which do not have a residence, but which want to form part of a national association and need restricted membership. ASA recognition allows the group official use of the MIT name and the ability to reserve rooms across campus.

Residential recognition, for FSILGs with a residence, the ASA grants them the possibility to reserve rooms on the Main Campus and maintain a presence in the Student Activities Database.
