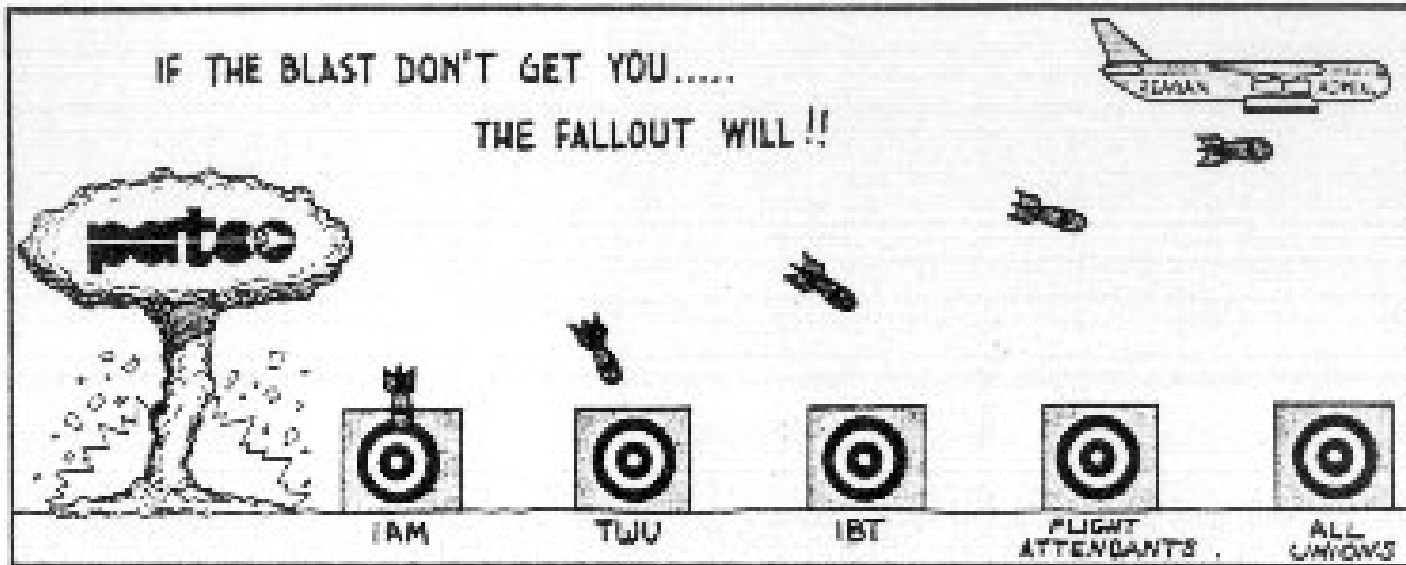

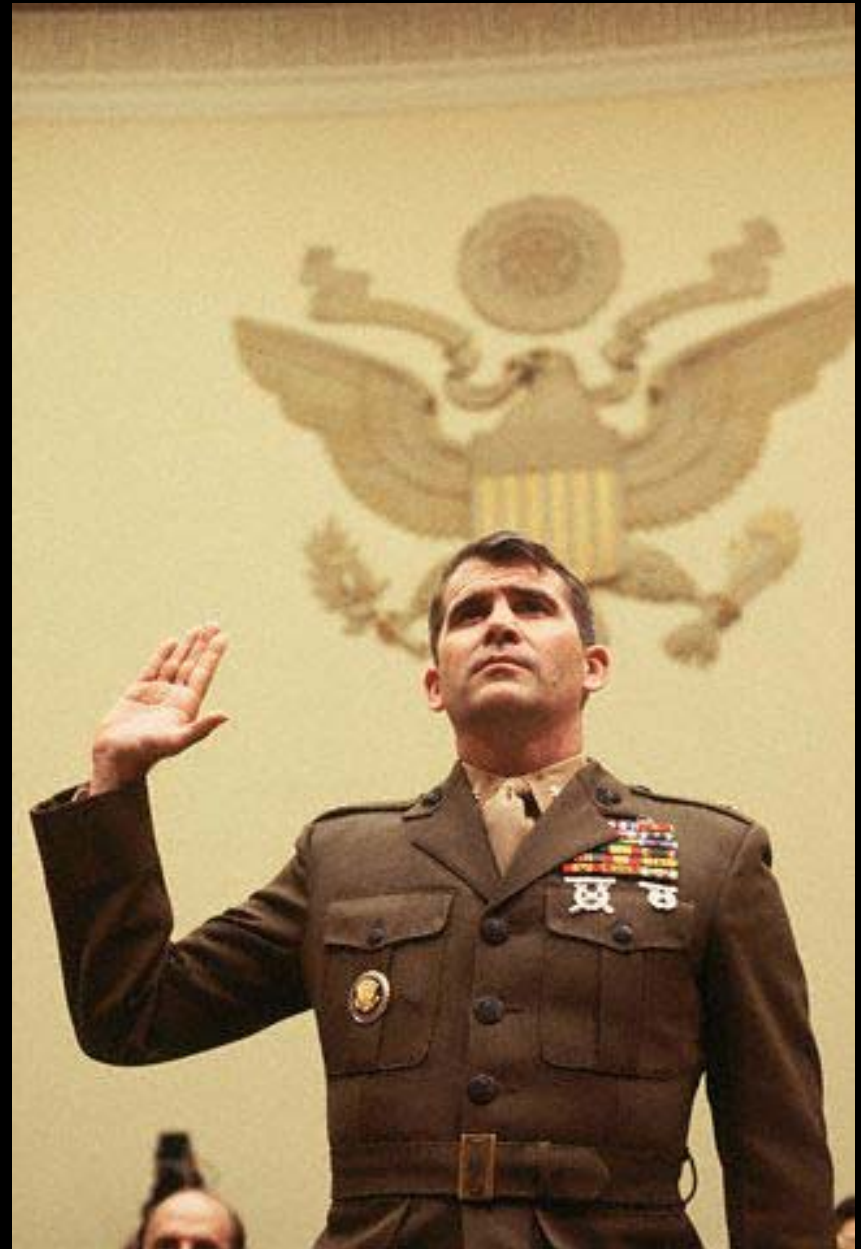

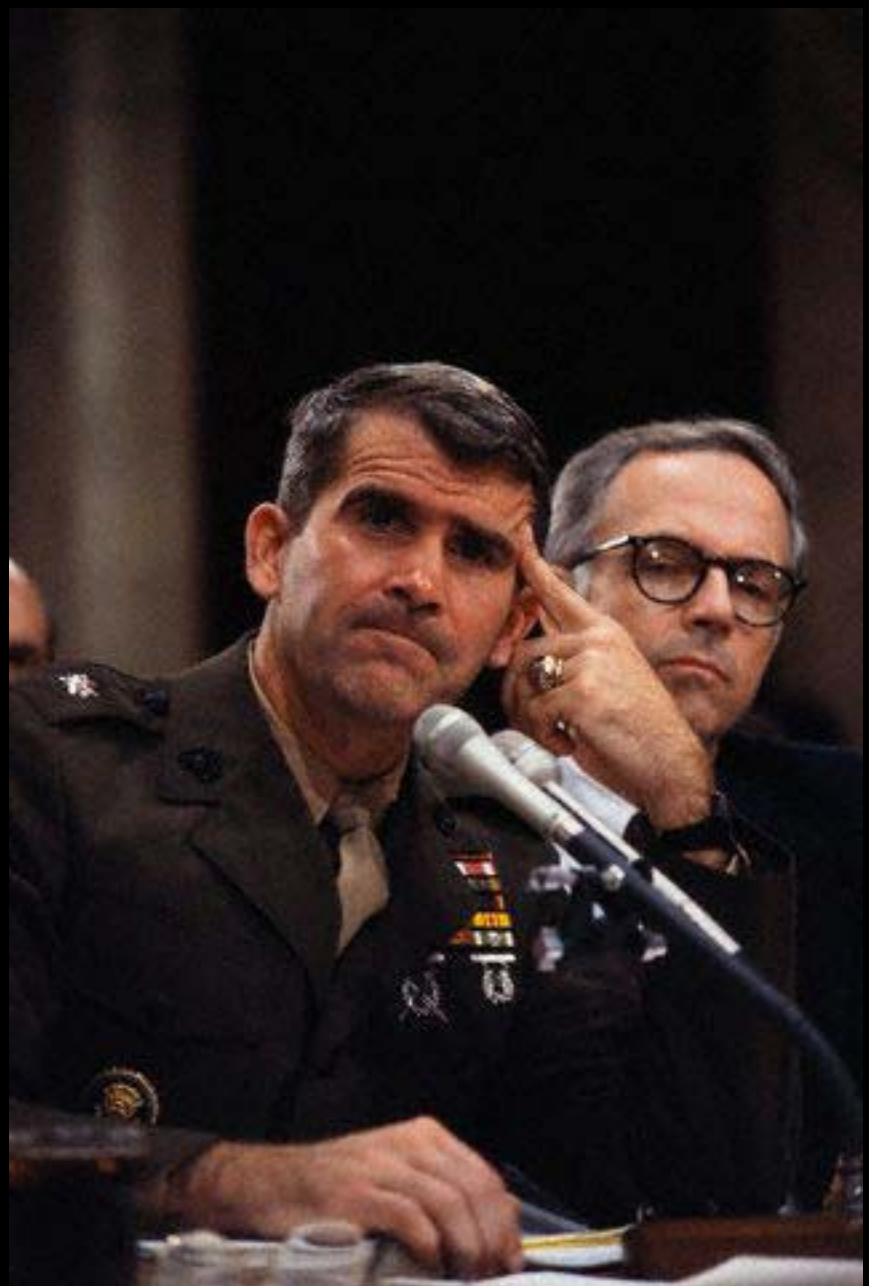

Will Dukakis Turn Gun Owners Into Criminals... While Murderers Go Free?

The Most Soft-on-Crime Governor in Massachusetts History is a Leading Advocate of Gun Control

Gov (Senr) Magslow quotes Dukakis as saying in 1986, "I don't believe in people owning guns, only the police and military. And I'm going to do everything I can to disarm this state." In 1976 Dukakis supported a (losing) statewide referendum which would have done just that. Dukakis has called for federal registration of all concealable handguns and has written, "... the solution to the problem of gun-inflicted violence must come at the national level."

Michael Dukakis talks about fighting crime, but there is a big gap between the rhetoric and the record. Maybe that's why the **Boston Police Patrolman's Association unanimously endorsed George Bush for President.**

While trying to deny the citizens of Massachusetts the right to defend themselves, Dukakis has put more convicted criminals on the streets than any governor in his state's history.

- He has used his gubernatorial pardoning power to commute the sentences of 44 convicted murderers—a record for the state of Massachusetts.
- He has voted and continues to oppose the death penalty under any circumstances, even for rap-killers, drug kingpins and incestors.
- He opposes mandatory sentences for hard-core criminals, but supports mandatory sentences for anyone caught with an unregistered gun of any kind.

Dukakis has also presided over and actively endorsed the most liberal prisoner furlough program in America, the **only one in the nation** releasing prisoners sentenced to life without parole.

- On average, in the state of Massachusetts, one convicted first degree murderer was released every day over the last seven years.
- Since the beginning of Dukakis' second term as Governor, 1,305 furloughs have been granted to first degree murderers and at least 4,409 furloughs to second degree murderers. He has given 2,565 furloughs to drug offenders.
- In 1986 alone, Dukakis gave 1,279 furloughs to low crime offenders, including 230 to persons charged with six or more sex offenses.
- Today 85 violent felons from Massachusetts are on the loose in America—out four on furloughs, they never bothered to come back.

Meet Willie Horton.

Willie Horton was sentenced in 1977 and sentenced to life in prison without parole for shooting a 17-year-old to death during a robbery. In 1986, on his sixth release under the Dukakis-supported furlough program, he escaped to Maryland, where he robbed and beat a man and then repeatedly raped his fiancée.

Horton was captured, but Maryland Judge Vincent Foran refused to send him back to Massachusetts saying, "I am not prepared to take the chance that Mr. Horton might be furloughed or otherwise released."



I would strongly urge the people of Massachusetts to stand up for Mr. Horton... not to bother to put out a fight for him because he won't be coming home." Judge Foran recommended that Horton, "should never draw a breath of fresh air again... and should die in prison." Michael Dukakis refused to even meet with the parents of the young Horton victim, saying, "I don't see any particular value in meeting with people... I'm satisfied... we have the kind of furlough policy we should have."

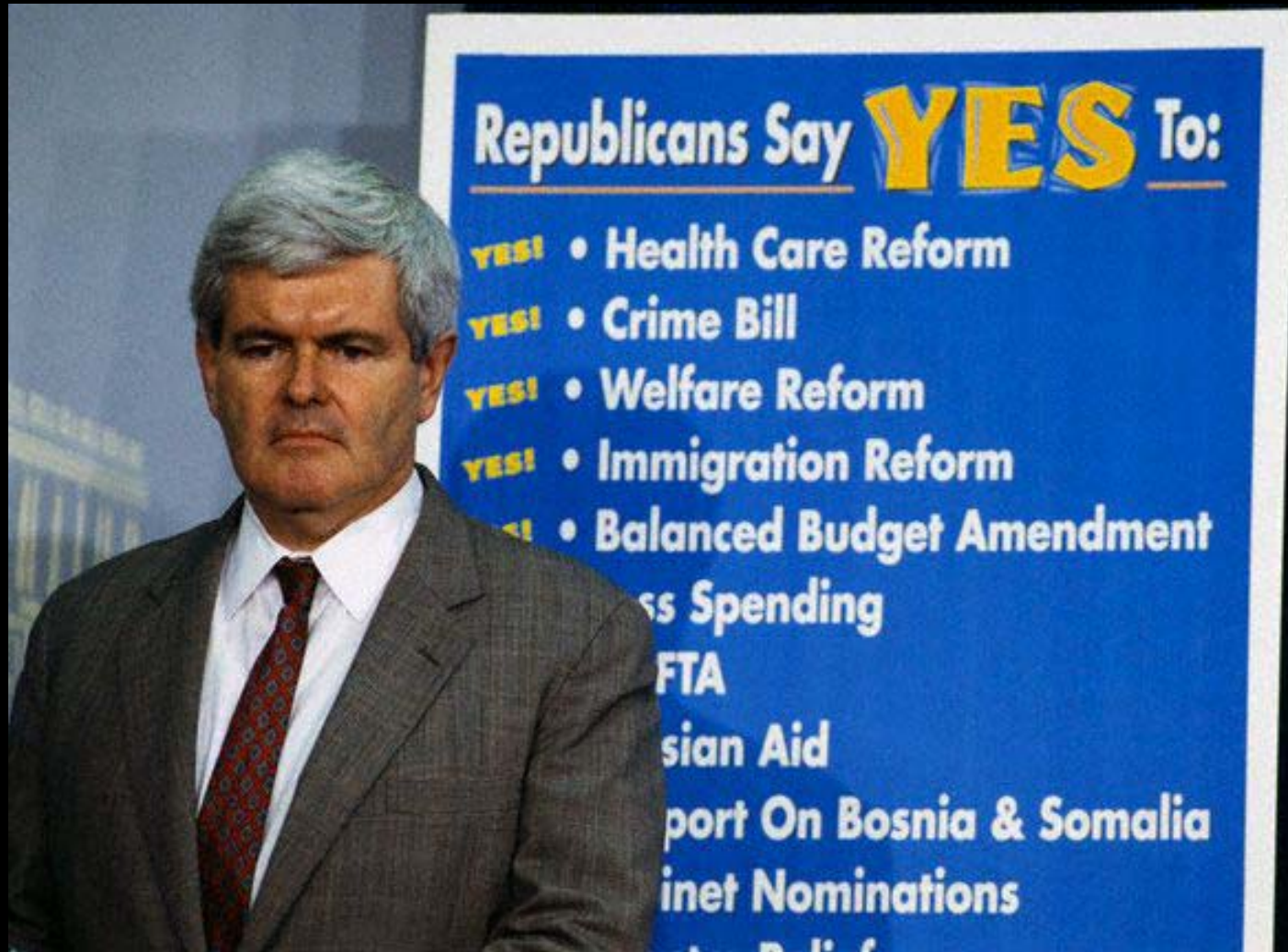

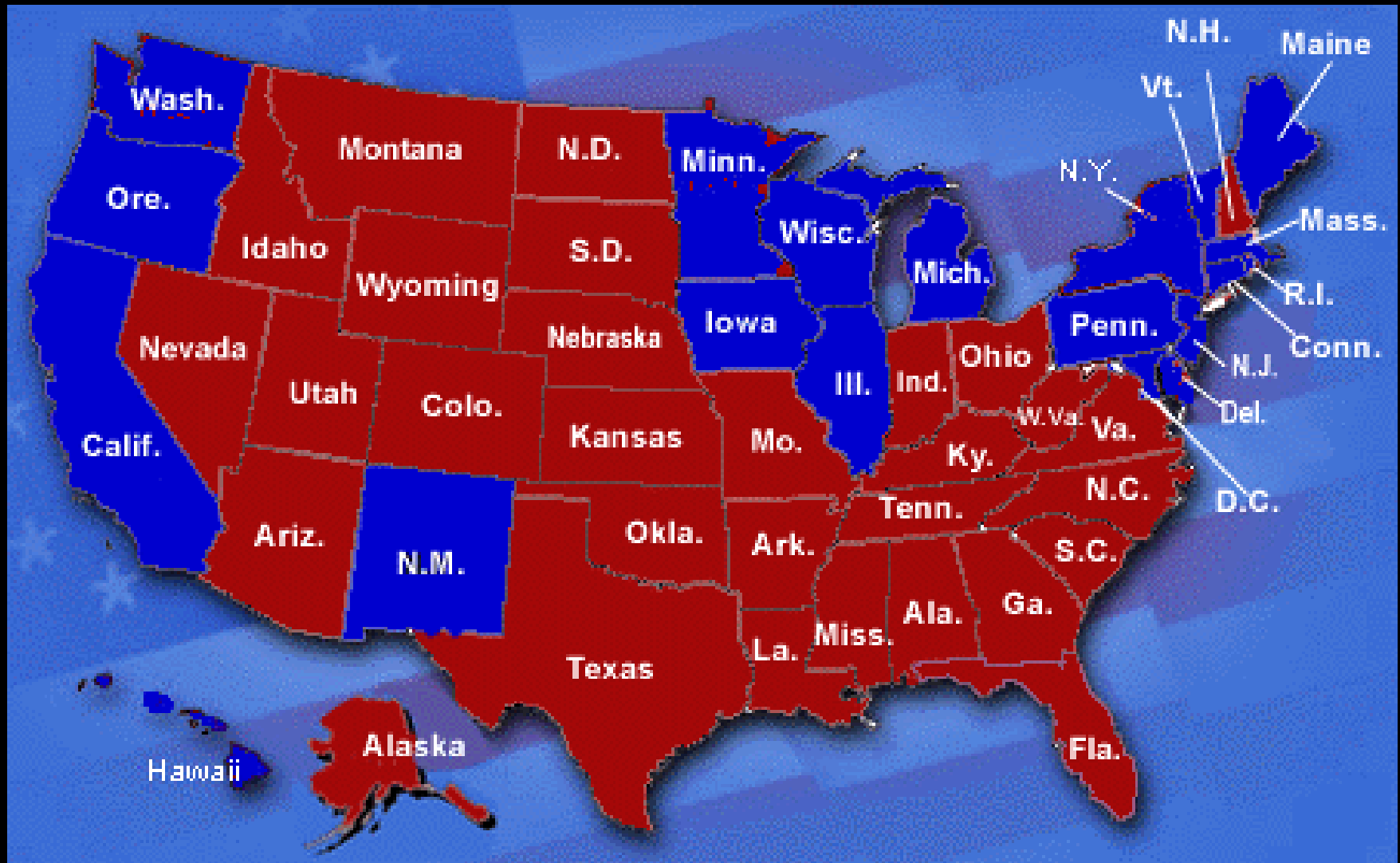

Electoral Map, 2000

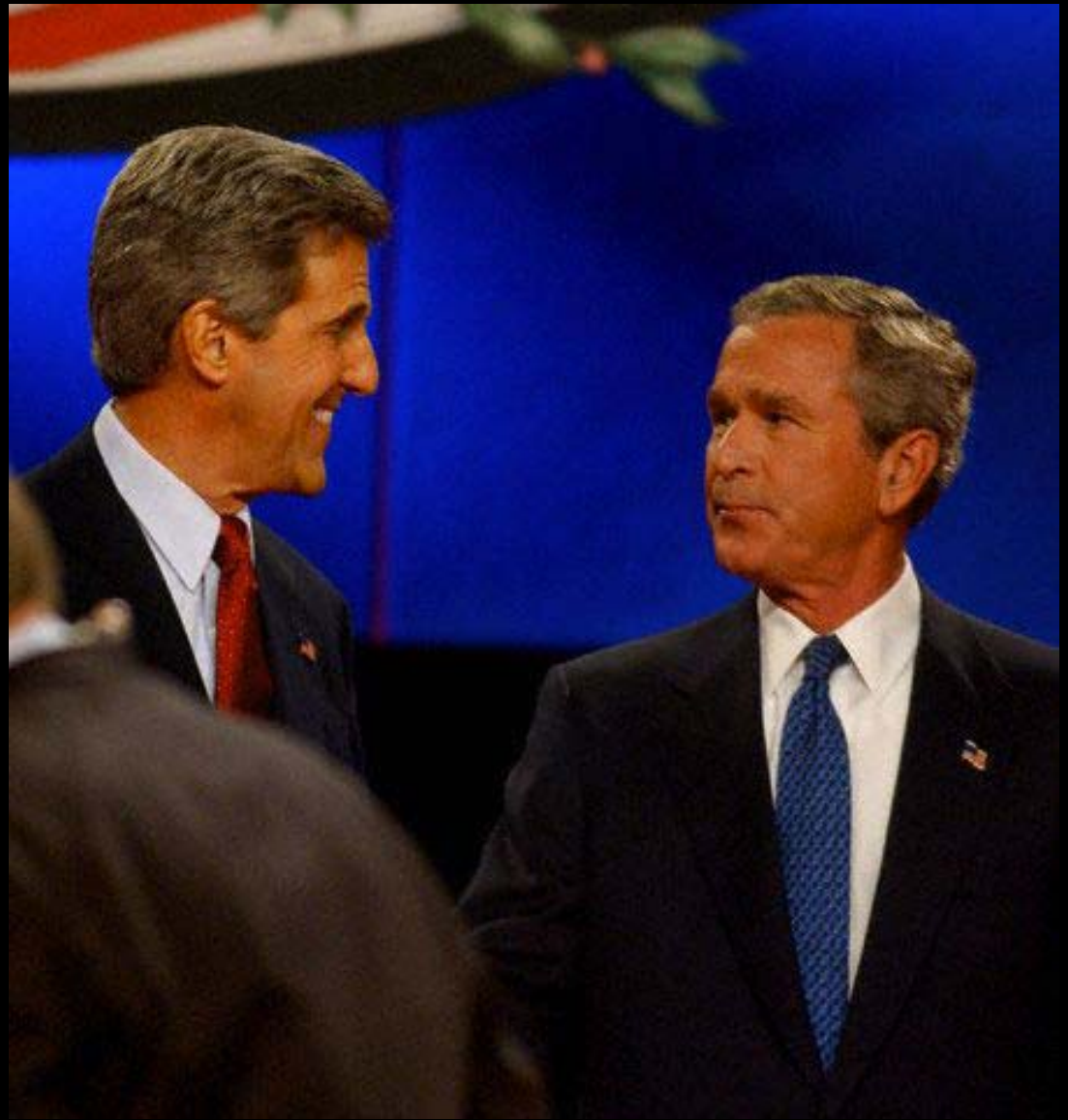


Florida Recount, 2000
