IV. コースの 目 標 (Course Objectives and Procedures)

This course covers *Genki* Lessons 19 through 23. The main objective of this course is to build up basic skills of communication in Japanese using appropriate speech levels in both writing and speaking for various social settings. At the completion of this course, you will be able to 1) demonstrate correct usage of intermediate grammar, including causative, passive, causative-passive forms of verbs, and some conditionals through various activities; 2) talk to people who are socially superior to you; 3) comprehend conversations on various topics spoken at near-natural speed as well as grasp the relationships among the people involved; 4) read and write 98 new kanji; 5) write in various forms; and 6) give brief presentations with specific objectives.

There are two types of class: Grammar Session and Drill Session. Prior to the grammar introduction for each lesson, you should read the grammar explanation of the textbook and practice new vocabulary. Prior to drill sessions, it is particularly important to review the patterns being learned, practice new vocabulary orally and memorize them so that you can fully benefit from the oral practice conducted in class.

C. 出席(Attendance Policy)

You must notify your instructor and submit a doctor's note or travel itinerary of your academic/job-related trip to arrange a make-up in advance. *Missing more than five classes without valid excuses may result in failing the course*.
