Close to the center of Allston, The Farrington is a 2-house B&B. Although some smaller rooms are a bit shabby and somewhat musty, larger doubles and apartment-sized complexes with kitchens are comfortable. Rooms range \$60-90 (for a double bed) and up but during the dead of winter (Dec.-Jan.), room rates drop and breakfast is complimentary. Converted apartments, convenient for longer stays (\$250-300/week) have kitchens

and wood balconies. Rates increase with demand and nice weather. All prices include an off-street parking space and local phone service. Some rooms are wheelchair-accessible.

Ask for one of the more spacious, well-decorated rooms and you might forget you're staying in a hotel. Up to 3 people/room; \$5 per additional person. Rooms \$50-90.

Situated in a restored late 19th-century brownstone, the Beacon Inn offers vaguely shabby rooms in a variety of sizes. Creaky hardwood floors and a dimly lit central stairwell make the place feel a bit cold. Rooms in the front have an appealing view of Beacon Street; those in the back look out on a dirty courtyard. Prices range from \$49-69 in the off-season to \$89-119 in peak season; rooms with private baths cost a bit more. Additional rooms are available at 1750 Beacon Street.

The bathrooms are spartan and the décor is a bit drab, but at this location and for these prices, you're not going to find anything better. If city noise doesn't bother you, request a room facing Newbury St. – the view is entertaining. Singles \$85/night or \$425/week; doubles \$99/night or \$550/week. ISIC discount 10%. Prepaid reservations required. No maid service.

A wonderfully charming B&B on a quiet residential street near Coolidge Corner, the Beech Tree Inn is an old Victorian home prettily infused with fresh life. Each of the 10 individually decorated and generously pillowed rooms boasts a telephone, air-conditioning, and ceiling fan. The non-smoking inn welcomes small children with puzzles and crayons. The large community kitchen serves complimentary continental breakfast. A common sitting room graced with plenty of cozy, high-backed lounging chairs sports a large TV as well as a book, game, and video library. Singles \$55-72; doubles \$95, with private bath \$125-135; triples with private bath \$150. Reservations a must if you're arriving in the evening or on weekends.

Ranging from Queen Anne-style antique suites to modern white walls and pastel carpeting, each room includes a kitchenette, private bathroom, cable TV, and local telephone access. Many rooms also have tiled fireplaces and sofas. Daily rates \$85-135; weekly fees \$500-600 for studios and \$650-750 for 1-bedroom apartment units.

The rooms are nicely furnished, but the less pricey ones tend to be cramped. A studio room (1 twin bed with kitchenette) goes for \$90; standard room (double with kitchenette) \$110; suites \$120-145. No roll-away beds. Coffee available 24hr.; continental breakfast included. Most rooms have A/C. No smoking. Parking \$15 in the adjacent garage. Prices can run as high as \$175 in busy seasons.

Some have ornamental fireplaces and bay windows. Rustic oil paintings and quilts adorn the hallways, and the air is scented with potpourri. Take a dip in the pool or catch some rays on the concrete-enclosed sundeck. Standard rooms can vary \$90-225, double rooms are around \$129 Nov.-Apr. Expect to pay within 2 weeks.

A moderately priced Chinese restaurant opens for breakfast, lunch, and dinner. Standard prices for all rooms are \$145-210, but some rooms go for as little as \$90, and some shoot upwards of \$200 during major events like the Boston Marathon. Wheelchair-accessible and smoking rooms available, as well as larger executive suites replete with VCR. Free parking in garage.

A charming inn, just 5 min. from the Harvard Quad and the Law School, the Mary Prentiss received a Mass. State Preservation Award – and it shows. 20 rooms in a gorgeously renovated 19th-century mansion (on the National Register of Historic Places) are tastefully furnished with tall or cannonball-post beds, flowered cotton comforters, and a choice of down or hypo-allergenic foam pillows. The location is quiet, the bathrooms spotless, and the staff friendly. Guests enjoy breakfast and an afternoon tea on the patio in the summer or by a fire in the dining room in the winter. A/C, telephones, and TVs in every room. No smoking on the premises. Free parking if requested in advance. Rooms (all doubles) range from \$169-229 and vary significantly with the season. Suites come for a bit more. An extra person is \$25/night, \$10/child. Harvard affiliates 10% discount.

Each room has a fireplace, private bathroom, double bed, and a fold-out couch. The prices range from \$160 in the off-season to \$235 at the peak. Kids are welcome, but smoking is not.

If the sushi bar, shoe-shine stand, gourmet café, health club, free afternoon cookies, and the largest ballroom in New England aren't enough to lure you to the Marriott, the rooms may very well be. Bright chambers with tasteful schemes and great views of Back Bay rooftops, the harbor, or the Charles River offer a bit more character than the average hotel chain. Fully wheelchair-accessible bathrooms and building. Rates fluctuate seasonally, but a "basic" room with 2 doubles or 1 king-sized bed runs \$239-299 in the off-season, while the "concierge level" upgraded rooms at the top of the hotel run \$269-329 and include access to a luxurious lounge with complimentary hors d'oeuvres in the evenings and a continental breakfast. Very limited valet parking (\$25/day).

Perhaps the first thing you'll see as you emerge into daylight from the Kendall T station, this 26-story hotel is formed in the competent Marriott mold, complete with a copy of the *J. Willard Marriott Story* next to the *Book of Mormon*. Because of its convenient central location and its proximity to both the T station and the bus stop, this hotel is louder and more hectic than most, and also is popular for business types. Airy rooms attired in forest green and mahogany wood feature a coffeemaker, cable TV with HBO, an iron and ironing board, and a king size or 2 double beds (\$209, no charge for additional people). Indoor pool and jacuzzi, sauna, and health club. The hotel also has 2 restaurants and a fast-food court. Call and inquire about lower promotional rates. Parking available at \$15/24hr.

Straddling Boston and Cambridge, this deluxe hotel is very conveniently located, especially thanks to complimentary shuttle service to Boston and the Square. The standard suite has a small living room with dining table, TV, and a couch that pulls out into a double bed; the bedroom proper is equipped with a queen-size bed or 2 twin beds (and another TV), and the hallway that connects the 2 rooms has a coffee maker and a refrigerator stocked with costly goodies. This luxurious set-up is \$209 during the off-season. Decoration may be a bit drab, but the spectacular views of Boston (2 mi. away) and the Charles river (20 ft. away) amply make up for the interior's relative simplicity. Prices range \$120-379, but watch for special rates during the holiday season. Amenities include an indoor pool, jacuzzi, sauna, fitness room, restaurant, and bar.

Renovated in 1988, the Eliot offers luxurious suites complete with air-conditioning, a living room, an Italian marble bath, a pantry, and a mini-bar. Some rooms even have kitchenettes. If you don't want to cook for yourself, though, look to Clio's, the Eliot's in-house restaurant, which has garnered Best Boston acclaim. Spacious 1-bedroom single suites cost \$225-255; for \$550 they'll open the door into an adjoining bedroom and turn it into a 1 bedroom suite. Since all single suites come with doubles (or queens) and a fold-out couch, you probably won't need the extra room unless you have more than four people. Rates vary seasonally. There are designated non-smoking floors and rooms are wheelchair-accessible.
