Director's Note

This play explores (among other things) how hard it is to truly understand someone else's point of view, or even one's own; how there really are at least two sides to most issues, even the ones you'd like to think are black and white; and how people can be both better and worse than they imagine themselves. It's also about different kinds of power, including the power of getting to define the rules of the game and the meaning of other people's actions, or one's own.

A friend of mine is fond of noting that "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you" is a good first step, but not sufficient; better, but much harder, is to do unto others as they would like you to do unto them.

I was drawn to Spike Heels because it both entertained and provoked me; I hope it will do the same for you.

She also enjoys voice acting and can be heard in the Post-Meridian Radio Players' production of *Tomes of Terror II* and several shows by Pendant Productions, her favorite being Barbara Gordon in *Batman: The Ace* of Detectives. Look for her soon in PMRP's *The Mask* of Inanna and Pendant's Red Sands Investigations.
