Cary Siress has a PhD from the ETH in Zurich where he is currently teaching. He also holds a Masters degree from Columbia and a B. Arch from Kentucky. He has several awards and publications both theoretical and practical in nature. His theoretical and practical research centers on the city in architectural discourse both historically and in contemporary terms, specifically those associated with metabolic and dynamic systems.
