

MIT Sandbox is an inclusive entrepreneurship program available to all undergraduate and graduate students.

The goal of MIT Sandbox is to lower the barrier for students to experience hands-on entrepreneurship and accelerate those with more advanced ideas or technologies.




MIT Sandbox secured \$2M/year with sponsors and investors to provide seed funding for students to experiment with innovation.

Tactile




Tactile is a text-to-Braille converter that gives blind individuals greater access to printed text.

MIT Sandbox Fund: Eligibility

Team

Teams must have:

- 1 full-time MIT student in leadership role
- In good academic standing

Teams can have:

- Undergraduate or graduate students, from any department at MIT
- Non-student and non-MIT members

Idea

- Idea must be for the purpose of creating a new business – forprofit or not-for-profit
- If the idea came from MIT-sponsored research, you must get TLO sign-off


Funding

- Prior or concurrent funding is acceptable below \$50K total
- Team must disclose other sources of funding.

Whether you are exploring a new idea or are ready to seek outside investor funding, the Funding Board will assess your business proposals based on these criteria:

SANDBOX AWARD RUBRIC	\$1K	\$5K	>\$10K
LEARNING Project has educational potential for students			
IDEA Students have identified a clearly defined problem			
PLAN Milestones must include customer discovery, product design, and technology validation			
MARKET POTENTIAL Team has completed preliminary market research and has proposals for a viable business model			

Teams will count on the support and guidance of top quality experienced professional mentors, one Sandbox fellow, and a network of expert advisors



MIT Sandbox Fund: Expectations

Step

Apply


- Proposal and budget plan
- Review board pitch (for applications >\$5K)

Step 2

Participate

- 6 15 hours/week total (relative to funding level):
 - 4 approved workshops per semester or equivalent
 - 2 coaching sessions per month
 - 1 individual
 - 1 with assigned subgroup
 - 1 page progress report per month
 - Final poster session or presentation
 - Optional: 1 paragraph progress report per week

MIT Sandbox Fund: Timeline



Reimbursements: How it works

- You will receive your MIT Sandbox funds in the form of reimbursements for purchases.
- Food/meals will be covered when associated with meetings with prospective customers or subjects of market research.
- Travel will be reimbursed only if approved by Sandbox executive director.
- MIT Sandbox funds are not to be used for outside developers or contractors. Some exceptions will be allowed with permission from the Sandbox executive director.
- Reimbursements will be disbursed to a teamdesignated treasurer.

Giving Back for +\$5K funding (non-binding, personal commitment)

- Students who receive +\$5K in funding will be encouraged to give back to the Fund or MIT
- Pledge to give back is a personal choice and not binding
- Funding will not be conditional on a student signing a pledge

MIT Sandbox: Sample Pledge language

Innovation Fund Program working on ______ ("Project"). In recognition of the contributions of the Program to my Project, I pledge to contribute funds back to the Program and/or the program supporters in an amount described below (the "Pledge").

..... The Pledge will be for an amount at least equal to the percent of the entity's equity value at that funding which equals the cumulative Round 2 and Round 3 grant funding I have received from the Program. The Pledge will be payable by cash or shares of the entity.
